Jack Oest wins Harmon Wilkes Award

Jack Oest was the recipient of the CCBA's highest honor, the Harmon Wilkes Award. CCBA Board member Suzi Subeck made the following remarks when making the presentation:

I would characterize this year's Harmon Wilkes winner as a great guy who is great for bridge. Though not currently on the CCBA BOD, he served several terms in the past. When he retired from Unit politics, he served District 13 as coordinator of Grand National Teams. He gave that up a few years ago, and now volunteers as Recorder for the United States Bridge Federation. He says yes to committees when asked and has chaired many of the more difficult Conduct committees for both District 13 and Unit 123.

Mentoring Juniors who are learning the game has long been a labor of love for him and one at which he is particularly skillful. He enjoys watching young players hone their skills, earning masterpoints in the process. In local Sectionals and Regionals, he partners with serious students who are striving to

become viable players in both national and world competition. While mentoring these players, he imparts to them his strong ethics, fun outlook, and respectful attitude for both his partner and his opponents. What they see at the table, they emulate and become better for it.

Young players like Kyle Rockoff and Ilan Wolff of Northwestern University and the University of Chicago respectively, share enthusiastic comments and appreciative accolades about this year's choice. Our winner has spent hours working with youngsters in the USBF Junior Training Program, including some who attended the World Youth Championships in China last year.

Jack is an accomplished player in his own right. In 1996, he represented the United States in the World Championship Olympiad in Rhodes, Greece. He was one of an all-Chicago team including Jerry Goldfein, Claude Vogel, Gary Cohler, Larry Robbins, and the late, great Gerald Caravelli. The CCBA Board of Directors believes we could not have made a better choice than this one.

In 2018, the CCBA ran its full roster of tournaments. Attendance at the Sunday Swiss Team Games, usually the staple of tournament attendance, fell off in 2018. There was no obvious explanation for that, and the Board would like to turn it around. Attendance at pair games was very good overall, making the drop in Swiss Team participation even more puzzling.

Thanks to Board Member and District 13 Director Suzi Subeck, the Windy City Tournament, which was reorganized as a short Regional in 2018, hosted a squad of Indonesian Bridge players that was traveling around the world promoting the Asian Games, which were being held in Jakarta. The squad played all week and collected a lot of "emas, emas!" (Gold in Indonesian.) Between the Indonesian players and Chair Bob Young's excellent manage-

ment, Windy City was a success and will take place next June at the UIC Student Center. Join us there. We need your participation to keep Windy City viable. And thanks to the Board of the Chicago Duplicate Bridge Center, which canceled its games during the tournament.

In October, the Central States Regional Tournament was held at the Grand Geneva Resort for the final time. The tournament will be re-sited in 2019 closer to our demographic core and will include weekend games. Various sites are under consideration. Watch the *Kibitzer* and the website for details. Note: The District 13 Spring Regional will still be held at the Grand Geneva in April.

At 9 a.m. on Friday, November 10, the ballroom in the Wyndham Garden Inn-Schaumburg looked very big - and empty. The tables were missing. They arrived at 9:40 a.m., and staff and players pitched in so willingly that the tournament began only a few minutes past 10.

Tonight you will be voting to amend the CCBA by-laws to incorporate an arbitration policy for tournament disputes. We would like to thank Mark Friedlander for heading up this project. While hoping that the policy will not be needed, its existence will protect the CCBA against the risk of prolonged and expensive litigation.

Thanks to an active, hard working Board, ACBL Directors, and you, the players, the CCBA is alive and well. Profitable would be even better, but we can't have everything. Changing demographics and rising site costs have taken our tournaments from always being in the black to "some of them sometimes being in the black." We need your participation to improve that, and I hope we'll see all of you often at our tournaments in 2019.

Ping Hu was the choice for the Carl Sharp Service Award because of his contributions to Unit 123, District 13, and ACBL. On his own initiative, Ping developed a software program that facilitates Swiss Team scoring with the electronic scoring machines. Suzi Subeck, who announced the award, commented that the program "really works great and Ping has put a ton of time into it. District 13 has been the guinea pig in testing it, and we have watched it reach the successful level it is today."

Also Ping was recognized for the time he spends mentoring a group of students at a school in Naperville. "His kids" participate in the school bridge tournaments, including one that was held recently in Chicago.

Feb. 18 deadline to register for GNT

The District 13 Grand National Team (GNT) competition will be played February 23 and 24 at the Hilton Northbrook,



2855 North Milwaukee Avenue, Northbrook. Be aware that pre-registration is required to play in the GNT.

All teams wishing to enter must provide notification by noon on February 18 by contacting Suzi Subeck, District 13 Director: 847-509-0311 home, 708-927-6819 cell, stansubeck@prodigy.net, or by registering at bridgeinchicago.com.

Flight eligibility is established by ACBL's September 2018 masterpoint cycle. This information was produced on August 6, 2018 in Horn Lake, MS. Masterpoints won after this cycle will not impact flight eligibility for these events.

Players must reside in District 13. Each member of the team must be a paid member in good standing with the ACBL.

Club qualifying may be required at the discretion of each Unit. A Flight B or Flight C team may qualify under the rules of any Unit where a plurality of team members reside. For more information, go to http://acbl-district13.org where there is a link to the flyer, or contact Suzi.

ACBL District 13 Director's Report

The ACBL Board of Directors voted to increase entry fees at North American Bridge Championships (NABC) commencing with Las Vegas 2019. Entry fees for regional events have not increased in more than 10 years, so I believe the raise is not inappropriate. The increases are \$4-\$5/session.

Entry fees at NABCs are changed to \$30 for NABC+ events, \$22 for other NABC events, \$20 for regional events, and \$20 for unlimited single session events. There is no change in the \$15 entry fee for Intermediate/Newcomer events.

The screen surcharge has been reinstated. At the point in any NABC event where screens come into play, teams will be assessed a surcharge to cover the cost of setup, delivery and maintenance.

Attendance at the Honolulu North American Bridge Championship was small-approximately 1,000 tables below expectations. The League will face severe attrition charges and playing space costs.

Districts where eight teams or more enter the District's Grand National Teams Flight B or Flight C finals may send a second team to the National competition in those flights starting in summer 2019. District 13 generally qualifies. Note that the League will provide no subsidy for these teams, so my guess is many districts will opt out because of the cost. I assume this will be discussed at the District Board of Directors meeting in Las Vegas in July.

In other business:

- Russ Jones from District 10 was elected 2019 president of the Board of Directors.
- Italian pro Lanzarotti, who was banned from ACBL events approximately 13 years ago for cheating, was readmitted to the League. He has admitted his guilt and is working with Italian juniors.
- The motion to eliminate the Senior Knock Out was reconsidered as per a request from the ACBL Board of Governors. The elimination stands.
- The Board of Directors in concert with management is working on a fragrance
 policy to eliminate the use of perfumes and scented body care products. Though
 allergies exist, a hard policy will not be instituted because it is impossible to enforce; however, reminders and requests to the membership to comply will be
 prominent.

Meet your 3 newly elected members to CCBA Board

The three new members elected to the CCBA Board of Directors at the Annual Meeting bring with them enthusiasm, a variety of skills, and a desire to serve and to promote bridge. They are Genny Cesario of Elmhurst, Mark Stein of Skokie, and Jim Diebel of Wood Dale.

They replace Steve Brown, Les Kent and Sharon Pobloske, who decided not to seek another term. Re-elected to the board were Todd Fisher and Guy Franklin. Each year five people are elected to three-year terms on the 15-member board.

Genny said that she volunteered to serve on the board, "because I want to give back in some way to the game that I've fallen in love with." She is a fairly new duplicate player, joining the ACBL in 2012 and becoming a Life Master last October.

She had played a little social bridge while in college and prior to starting her family, but it wasn't until after retirement that she decided to take the game seriously and began playing in the clubs. "I didn't even know what a convention card was."

As a goal-oriented person, she took lessons and as you might expect of a former educator and school librarian, she bought and read a number of books. She said, "I like the mental and social aspects of the game, as well as the challenge."

"As a board member, I'm especially interested in working with the I/N players. Since I'm so new to duplicate bridge, I'm familiar with what they are going through, and I'd like to help them in some way" she said.

Mark echoed Genny's desire to give back to the bridge community. He is especially interested in getting young people interested in the game.

"We need young players, and I would like to see bridge clubs in the high schools. I have mentored - and learned from - the current generation of Northwestern University's bridge players," Mark said.



It was in high school that Mark learned to play bridge. At the at of 16, he went to the Palmer House in Chicago for the ACBL Nationals and won the novice pair event with his high school partner.

During the three years he attended the University of Illinois in Urbana, "I played against Chip Martel, Jerry Goldfein, Karen Walker and many other top players. I had success in my very first Grand National team tournament, and there were no brackets back then."

Today, he plays bridge about twice a week, and enjoys playing in regional

tournaments, when his schedule allows. Mark works full time, and is an attorney in private practice, doing wills, trusts, and estate planning.

Jim "Wimpy," who loves games had tried others including chess and backgammon, before discovering the game of bridge while attending the U of I. He asked a backgammon player, who also played bridge, to teach him how to play the card game, "but he declined. So I went out and bought a book and taught myself. The first day I showed up at the Champaign DBC, I didn't have a partner and played with the owner, Karen Walker of *Bulletin* fame. I earned my first .16 of a masterpoint," he said It was at that club that he met students Brian Blackmore and Jim O'Neill, his future bridge partners.

"In 1989 at the Nationals in Salt Lake City, I struck up an unlikely partnership with Wayne Eggers. It was unlikely because he was an established top player, and I was an arrogant intermediate. Over the course of that week, he taught me a great many things. The most important was that bridge is a partnership game," he said.

Jim taught high school for five years in the 1990's, but quit after his father had a stroke in 1997. Around 2005 Kathy Burt, who co-owned a bridge club, asked him to direct, which led to him directing at other clubs, as well. And when Kathy moved to Florida, he bought her club and a club owned by Jackie Addis, and runs them on Tuesdays and Fridays in Naperville. In addition, he assumed ownership of a Friday night game in Elmhurst, and "I've been trying hard to keep it going. It's hard because as

our demographic ages, fewer and fewer are interested in going out at night." He also teaches bridge.

Jim said he is joining the board because "it is time for me to give back. Bridge has been good to me, and I would like to keep it alive and healthy for decades to come."

Meanings of 1NT or 2NT must be considered in context

Unfortunately, 1NT and 2NT have many different meanings in bridge – context is everything. Some might be minimum, others maximum, and it might even be a two-suited takeout.

Can you decide what South or North is telling you with their NT bid in the following sequences?

Answers:

- 1. This is a somewhat constructive response of about good 7 10 high card points (HCP) and at least one spade stopper. You do not need to respond with a weak 6-7 HCP as opener gets another chance to bid. Example: ♠KJ5 ♥J4 ◆T973 ♣OJ96
- 2. 11-12 HCP with no four-card major and assorted stoppers, esp in the majors. It is invitational, but not forcing.

Example: ♠KJ5 ♥AJ4 ♦973 QT96

- 3. 12-14 HCP balanced hand, with less than four-card spades. Example: ♠ KJ5 ♥ Q4 ♦ KT9 ♣ AT963
- 4. 18 -19 HCP balanced hand, highly invitational but not forcing. Example: ♠KJ5 ♥AQ94 ♠KQ97 ♣AT
- 5. Natural 15-18 HCP balanced hand with heart stopper(s). South can use Stayman and Transfer bids. This is NOT

the unusual NT because there was no jump to 2NT. Example: ♠AJ ♥AQ9 ♦ KJ974 ♣QT5

6. 18 -19 HCP balanced hand, but because responder didn't bid and has less than six HCP, it is not necessary to jump to 2NT to show the extras. If opener thinks he can make one NT opposite little or nothing, he has to have extras.

Example: ♠KJ5 ♥AQ ♦KQJ97 KT6

- 7. Takeout showing a two-suited hand with at least 5-5 in the minors. The distribution and vulnerability is more important than HCP, but I would say at least 8+ HCP and decent quality suits. This bid often sets the stage for a later sacrifice when opener's side is vulnerable and the 2NT bidders'side is not vulnerable. Example: ♠5 ♥83 ♦KQT97 ♣AT962
- 8. 12-14 HCP balanced hand, with spades stopped. Example: ♠AJ9 ♥KQ94 KT95 ♣63
- 9. 18 -19 HCP balanced hand, with diamonds stopped. Example: ★ K85 ▼ AO94 ◆ AO ♣ AT75

Which signal do you prefer - Count or attitude?



Winning with Wimpy By Jim Diebel

Much of what we do today is the same as that done 60-80 years ago, but much has changed. If you learned this game reading an old classic, like *Five Weeks to Winning Bridge*, you were brought up on four-card majors, forcing jump raises, and very few conventions.

One of the innovations over the last 30 years or so has been the switch from standard defensive signals to Upside Down (UDCA).

I've written several columns over the last 12 years about them, but mistakes are still common. Several people I've met choose to play Upside Down Attitude (UDA) but standard count. This actually is fine, but most would find it confusing.

Suppose partner leads the ♠A (from AK) against a heart contract. Dummy hits with: ♠J74 ◆KQ94 ◆K75 ♣865

If you play the \$2, do you know whether it is count or attitude? If you play UDCA, whether you held \$82 or \$Q82, you don't really care. The \$2 (which is attitude) is correct either way, since you desire partner to cash another high spade and lead a third one. This is why I believe playing BOTH upside count and upside attitude is less confusing.

Change dummy to \$J754 ♥ KQ94 ♦ K75 \$86 and you can no longer afford to play the \$2 from \$Q82, This is because requesting a spade continuation will eventually lead to setting up dummy's \$J\$ when your \$Q\$ gets ruffed out.

Even if spades are 3-4-3-3 around the table, it's usually not a good idea to set up tricks for declarer if you can avoid it. The general rule is that if the count signal conflicts with the attitude signal, then the count signal takes precedence; therefore, from \$Q82\$, you would play the \$8\$. Partner would not know who has the \$Q\$, but at least he knows you won't be ruffing the third spade.

A slightly easier example to understand would be when dummy hits with ♠Q86. Here, both defenders can see that dummy will win the third spade, and it's only safe to continue if third hand can ruff the third round. Therefore, UDCA players would play the ♠2, (count), from ♠72, or the ♠J2, but the ♠7 from ♠J72. Both defenders know it's a count situation, because both can see the danger of continuation.

UDA and Standard Count enthusiasts have it easy as well. Once again both defenders can see the danger of continuation, so third hand plays the \$7 (count), from \$72, the \$J from \$J2 and the \$2 from the \$J72.

Going back to the example where dummy has \$J754, it may be critical that both defenders recognize that this is a count situation. Thus, once again the UDCA player selects the \$2 (count), from \$82 and the \$8 from \$Q82. Whether or not the opening leader interprets the signal as count or attitude, he will go right.

The UDA player who uses Standard Count must trust that partner is on the same wavelength.

Dummy hits with \$J754, and recognizing that this is a count situation, third chair correctly plays the \$2 (count), from \$Q82. If opener mistakenly reads this as a come on signal, the defense will slip and set up the \$J for declarer.

For this exact reason, most players using UDA choose to use UDC as well. It simply avoids confusion.

How strange to play a different card from the same holding depending on dummy!

Although it is necessary to send different signals in different situations, players who play both UDC and UDA don't have to worry about whether the opening leader is reading the signal as it was intended.

As I've said many times, attitude and count are usually linked, and it's simply easier then to send the message you want with the same card in either case.

This is probably a good time to give some general guidelines about when a defender's card is count and when it is attitude.

A defender's card is attitude when:

- 1. Opening leader leads an honor and third seat follows.
- 2. A defender who cannot follow suit discards a different suit.
- 3. A defender leads low, dummy wins with an ace or king, and third hand follows suit.
- 1. Opener leader wants to know if it is safe to continue the suit he is leading. Regardless of system, an encouraging card sends the message that the third seat holds an honor equal to the sequence promised by the opener, or (if a suit contract) that third seat intends to trump the third round of the suit. In situations where continuing a suit risks setting up a trick for declarer, the count signal takes precedence.

- 2. The first discard in a suit is generally an attitude discard. The main exception occurs when a defender makes a discard in dummy's long suit when there is no obvious outside entry. In this case only, the discard is count.
- 3. When dummy wins a trick with an ace or king, opening leader wants to know if it is safe and wise to continue the suit, should he gain the lead. Since the opening leader most often has originally led from a king or a queen, third chair signals encouragement if it holds the king or queen when dummy's ace wins the first trick. With neither, third chair signals negatively. If dummy wins the first trick with a king, opener knows you don't have the ace (else you presumably would have won the trick). The only question he has is whether you hold the queen, so that he might underlead his ace or jack profitably. Holding the queen, third chair signals encouragement, otherwise discourages.

Finally, if dummy wins with a queen or less, the assumption is that you do NOT like the suit. Attitude is known. Therefore, third chair gives COUNT.

A defender's card is count when:

- 1. Second Chair follows suit to a trick that he does not intend to win.
- 2. Fourth Chair follows suit to a trick that he does not win.
- 3. Third Chair follows suit to partner's lead and dummy wins the trick with a Queen or less (see above)
- 4. Third Chair follows suit to partner's high honor lead defending a contract on the 5-level or higher.

Basically, if declarer is leading a suit, you give count. If partner is leading a suit, you try to win it, and when you can't, you give count.

Against high level contracts, partner is usually more interested in whether or not a second card in a suit will cash rather than whether continuing might give up a trick later. For that reason, many pairs agree to give count to partner's Ace (or King) if the contract is at the 5 or 6 level.

So there you have it. Whether you play standard or upside down, or some combination of the two, you need to know which signal you are sending. More important than that, your partner needs to know what your signal means as well.

Next issue, we'll delve deeper into some common and not-so-common count situations where many defenders often go wrong.
